Auditing

- Audit at least once every 3 years
- Three-week audit for CalARP Program 3
- ISO applicability adds one week to audit
- Teams of 3-4 engineers

Increased Review after MCAR



- The ISO authorizes additional studies after a Major Chemical Accident or Release (MCAR)
- These studies have included:
 - Safety Culture Assessment
 - Root Cause Investigation
 - Community Risk Assessment
 - Safety Inspection
- Formation of Oversight Committees



- Oversight Committees used to maintain a transparent process
- Comprised of members of the public, agencies, and facility
- They assist in developing the scope of the study, interviewing and selecting contractors, reviewing reports

Bulk Liquid Storage Stationary SourceApplicability Review

Applicability:

- Required to have an SPCC Plan
- Has a field erected tank of 50,000-gallon shell capacity and contains a flammable liquid with an NFPA 704 flammable 3 rating
- 8 facilities identified in initial review (3 County, 1 city of Martinez, 4 City of Richmond)

City Clerk Ballot Measure 2024

City Council Meeting November 15, 2023

BACKGROUND



- October 18, 2023 The Mayor recapped a recent discussion with the elected City Clerk, who had
 indicated he supported the consolidation of the elected City Clerk position into an appointed
 staff position. The proposed consolidation of the Clerk position was based upon the professional
 recommendations of City staff and consistent with practice in 16 of 19 Contra Costa agencies.
 - The City Council directed staff to place this topic on a future meeting agenda for discussion.
- **November 1, 2023** Staff presented to City Council a comparative analysis of Clerk Offices in other California municipalities who recently transitioned their City Clerk to an appointed position. City Council favored the proposal and directed:
 - Delegating the appointing authority to City Manager.
 - Clarifying the appointed position will be a consolidation of the elected position with the existing fulltime staff position, resulting in reclassifying the Assistant City Clerk as City Clerk.
 - Providing an organizational model of the Clerk's office with an appointed City Clerk.
 - Appointing Vice Mayor Ross and Councilmember McKillop to an Ad Hoc Subcommittee for drafting the Argument in Favor.

Division Summary

Through the Assistant City Clerk, the Office serves as a primary point of contact for the City Council, City Departments, and the public regarding the legislative history and operations of the City.

Elected Office Structure (Current)

Division under and managed by the Department of the City Manager.

- Gary Hernandez, City Clerk (Elected) Elected Official serving in a ceremonial capacity performing limited duties.
- Kat Galileo, Assistant City Clerk (FTE)— Full time staff employee who performs all legal duties and responsibilities of the City Clerk, as well as the day-to-day operations of the Office.
- Catherine Muiruri, Clerk Aide (PT) Part time staff employee provides general administrative support to the Assistant City Clerk and customer service to the Martinez community.

 - Future Claims, Records Management (Laserfiche)
- Organizational structure and staffing data collected of other Clerk Offices
 - Martinez is in the minority in the County (3/19 cities) and in the State (100/482 cities).

BALLOT MEASURE



Key Components

- Submit to voters for a question regarding whether the City Clerk should be appointive
- Calls, gives notice of, and requests consolidation of a Special Municipal Election with the March 5, 2024 Statewide Primary Election
- Impartial Analysis and Argument in Favor

Voter Approved Measure

- Elected City Clerk will serve until November 2024;
 position eliminated thereafter.
- Creates appointive City Clerk staff position (full authority); City Manager becomes the Appointing Authority, through delegation by City Council (GC Section 36510). Municipal Code updated.
- November 2024 ballot will not include the race for the City Clerk's Office.

FISCAL IMPACT



Savings

Savings will be reinvested into the Office to cover anticipated expenses and support the Office as it is restructured.

 - Funded in FY 2024 mid-year budget adjustment
- Position upgrade from Assistant City Clerk to City Clerk

Background

- The Urban Greening Program is a grant program administered by the California Natural Resources Agency (CRNA). All projects must do at least one of the following:
 - Acquire, create, enhance, or expand community parks and green spaces
 - Use natural systems or systems that mimic natural systems to achieve multiple benefits
- This competitive program solicits project proposals for urban greening projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions, mitigate the effects of extreme heat, and provide multiple additional benefits.
- Grant was identified by California Consulting, the City's grant writing consultant.
- Proposals are due on Monday November 20, 2023 at 5:00pm.
- The Urban Greening grant would address the unfunded restoration improvements identified in the Lower Alhambra Creek Watershed Management Plan.





Discussion

- The proposal submittal is being prepared but will be consistent with the preliminary plans which will restore Alhambra Creek from the Union Pacific railroad to Ward Street.
- The project would restore wetland and riparian habitat, remove accumulated silt and sediments to enhance flood protection, and provide native vegetation planting.











Fiscal Impact

- Preliminary cost estimate and grant request is approximately \$750,000.

The man that was playing pickle ball said our Tennis only sign did not have an ordinance number so he deemed the signs fake, even though we assured him they were put up by the city. In a strange coincidence, the signs went missing the next day. In which the police were notified and the city was out lickety-split to install new ones and bent the bolts so they could not be removed.

It's concerning to me because the lady that called the police on that guy is the nicest lady. And I was shocked that she confronted him because she is so nice.

We just want to play tennis without conflict. Maybe an official ordinance is the answer. With it, the police have something to use for enforcement. Greetings:

I am planning to attend and hope to make the following comments during the council special session on the Martinez Industrial Safety Ordinance, but I also wanted to provide my comments in writing for the record....

My name is Daniel Barrows and I have lived and worked in Martinez for the past 15 years. To start out, I am fully in support of the adoption of a Martinez Industrial Safety Ordinance (MISO) if it will help to improve the safety of our citizens. But I am concerned that this is not going to address the real issue with the Martinez refinery. When choosing to live in Martinez, I was aware of the neighboring refinery and felt confident that its operation by a well-respected multinational company, Shell Oil, was safe. I was alarmed when Shell chose to sell the refinery, a decision which I'm sure related to its profitability. Certainly a company such as Shell would not sell such an asset unless they had determined that the ongoing cost of operating and maintaining it was no longer profitable. I mean, that's why they are in business. The refinery is well over 100 years old and certainly, at some point in the future, will reach the end of its useful life. I am concerned about what will happen when its current owners determine that it's no longer profitable for them. Given how old the refinery is, that's bound to happen sometime in the foreseeable future. When it does, what provisions are there to ensure that the refinery is decommissioned safely and not left a burden to the citizens of Martinez and Contra Costa County to deal with? Any measure the city adopts should address not only the safe operation of the refinery (or any other industrial operation), but also its safe decommissioning, demolition, and clean up of the land and soil that it sits on once it reaches its end-of-life. The citizens of Martinez and Contra Costa County should not be saddled with the costs or potential health and safety issues of this in the future.
